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1445 - 1600	The Fentanyl Crisis and Sexual Exploitation
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The Fentanyl crisis is not going anywhere. In 2016 in BC we had 917 deaths due to Fentanyl, and the numbers are increasing early into 2017. Additionally, every week we have multiple non-fatal overdoses due to Fentanyl. Despite these overdoses, youth are continuing to use.

The world of social media has given predators and exploiters a valuable tool to lure youth into the world of exploitation, and with the presence of Fentanyl that risk has now increased to numbers we have- not seen before. Exploiters are using various successful strategies to introduce Fentanyl to youth (often covertly) and once addicted they can exploit these young people into the sex trade.

0900 - 1030 An Overview of Sexual Exploitation and the Modern-Day Predator

This session will address the tactics that the modern-day predator, an exploiter, uses to groom their victims, focusing on peer grooming and online grooming. It will be addressed that prevention and safety of children and youth will rely on their knowledge in identifying signs of grooming vs a focus on identifying an exploiter by their looks.

According to the Counter Exploitation Unit in Vancouver, 95% of grooming into sexual exploitation begins online. Half of this session will focus on tactics relating to online grooming beginning with an introduction activity that will engage participants in matching popular app logo's amongst youth to the app's description and its risks. A follow up discussion will be had incorporating the tips from the Integrated Child Exploitation unit as well as tips gained through experience working front-line with youth victims regarding online safety. Although each app has its own unique functions, there are commonalities amongst all apps that service providers and front-line workers can look out for, including an apps ability to transfer platforms, the ability to share photos, and the ability to remain anonymous.

This discussion will be supplemented by stories that will exemplify the information shared. The remaining half of the workshop will discuss how more than 50% of in person grooming involves females grooming females and the tools and tips for working with youth that can help them identify a female groomer. The session will end with a summary of tips and tools that service providers and frontline workers can take away.
